TODAY'S GOSPEL MESSAGE
"THE CHRIST"

“Who do you say that I am?”

Obviously people were commenting about Jesus, what He was doing and who He might be. Was He the promised Messiah? Jesus put the question to the apostles. Peter replied that some say “You are the Baptist returned or one of the prophets.” He said to Peter, “And what do you say?” Peter replied, “You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God.” In this response, Peter said “You are the Anointed One that has been promised as Savior.”

The prophets had spoken repeatedly of a promised Messiah “who would come and save the people from their sins.” The people waited for centuries hoping that the Messiah would come and save them, although many thought of Him as a political figure. We refer to Jesus as Christ. What do we mean when we use the title? Christ is not a name or Jesus’ last name. It is a title. To the people of His time, it meant “the one anointed by God for a special mission to save His people.” In calling Him “The Christ”, Peter was acknowledging Him as the Savior who had been promised.

If Jesus were to ask us, “Who do you say that I am?” How would we respond? Do we look on Jesus as a Savior in the sense of someone who is there to help us in moments of need or times of crisis? Yes, He is there for us in such situations, but He is much more. Jesus has given His life, in sacrifice, to give us eternal life and all that we need in this life to help us achieve it. He was anointed by the Father to overcome evil in this world. As we profess our faith in Jesus as Messiah, we are also making a commitment to continue His work. That work is to overcome evil and make God’s presence to be seen and felt in our world. Are we striving to overcome alienation in our world? Are we working to promote honesty in business and the workplace? Are we trying to promote justice in our society so that everyone has a rightful share of the good things of life?

If we claim to be followers of Christ, then we must dedicate ourselves to His work of justice and right. It may not be glamorous work sometimes, but we are not alone. Christ is with us, giving us the power and the grace to continue His mission. May we always be dedicated to promoting the mission of the Christ.

Beans and Race – Two Dominican Republic Experiences by Roland Schlierf

The night before I left for the Dominican Republic I found myself, as usual, relaxing in my 2000+ sq. ft. home in air conditioning on my couch, watching TV, while eating a big bowl of ice cream. On my first night with my new Dominican family, my Dominican dad for the week was already asleep. He will be up before everyone to harvest again all day, every day. I found myself in an 800 sq. ft. home with no air conditioning, sitting on a wooden stool, offering to shuck beans with my new mom and my 2 new small brothers by candlelight. The 3 of us shucked about 5 pounds of beans in 30 minutes. It was curiously peaceful. Later in the week, the boys took me on a 15 minute walk to the store to sell a pound of our beans for \$1.00. For this chore, they were allowed to buy themselves 6 pieces of chicklet gum and they gave me 2. Wow! The beauty, joy, generosity and hospitality in La Cucarita is quite overwhelming. On my second day, I found myself in a small 1 room open air school house in La Cueva. During lunch, I asked the local boys if we had time to go see the river and cave that their village was named after. They skeptically explained that it was a rigorous 1 mile down hill hike and that we only had 45 minutes until school resumed. "Rapido" I exclaimed, as our small group of American and Dominican boys ran down the mountain while several other small boys excitedly

joined us on the way down. The original cave had collapsed years ago, but nonetheless, what a beautiful mountain and river they all have to live, work and play in, but now time was running short. The race back to the school at the top was "on", but then half way up, Zach Heibel, pointed out to me someone was crying behind us. We stopped and it was the smallest local boy. In my broken excuse for Spanish, we were able to determine in a minute or so that this small local boy was not physically hurt at all. He was just upset that he was forgotten by us and was being left behind. As it turned out, every person from our little impromptu expedition had stopped and we all decided to have this smallest of boys go to the front and lead our pack the remainder of the way back up to the school. Moreover, we all made it on time. Once again, I found myself completely overwhelmed in the realization that these lovely people of La Cucarita and La Cueva have so much to offer us in learning the joys of slowing down a bit and they really ask for so little. It seems to me that they mostly just do not want to be forgotten by us and left behind, and there is so much we can learn from them by simply slowing down our pace of life. Moreover, we can all make the journey to our Lord on time together and be much better off for it. Our Sister Diocese is truly a sacred place.



FROM THE DEACON'S DEN

Clearly today's Gospel indicates the unique role Peter played in the Church. Don't ever feel apologetic about the Church's teaching concerning the Papacy. Other apostles played unique roles in the Church, for along with Peter only John and James were at the Transfiguration. Jesus paid the Temple tax for himself and Peter. He gave the "keys" of the Kingdom to Peter. Peter walked on water. Even though John is the first to Jesus' burial site, he waits for Peter to enter first. Finally, in John 21:15-7 Peter is clearly called to shepherd the Church by Jesus. I have a handout with all the Gospel references to Peter and a list of the times when Paul mentions Peter in his letters. As we look at each apostle we might wonder why Peter? After all he was the one who denied Jesus three times! This is precisely why Jesus chooses Peter, because Peter finally realizes how weak he is and that he cannot truly follow Jesus without grace and the Holy Spirit. We are all sinners and we can all be deceived, so we need an authority in our lives who cannot be deceived. The Pope is the only one who Jesus promised would not be deceived when

he is teaching us Truth. *"The Roman Pontiff, head of the college of bishops, enjoys this infallibility in virtue of his office, when, as supreme pastor and teacher of all the faithful - who confirms his brethren in the faith he proclaims by a definitive act a doctrine pertaining to faith or morals. . . . The infallibility promised to the Church is also present in the body of bishops when, together with Peter's successor, they exercise the supreme Magisterium," above all in an Ecumenical Council. When the Church through its supreme Magisterium proposes a doctrine "for belief as being divinely revealed," and as the teaching of Christ, the definitions "must be adhered to with the obedience of faith." (CC 891)* This infallibility is a gift that brings many to the Church, including non-Catholic ministers because they come to realize the problems faced by so many Christians when they are their own "Pope" and final authority. If you study Church history you will find that even our most sinful Popes did not teach false doctrine. If you are interested in these references concerning Peter's unique role let me know.

6. Humor deepens our relationship with God

One of the best ways of thinking about prayer is as a personal relationship. Like any relationship, our relationship with God often starts with infatuation, it goes through exciting and sometimes dry periods, it requires time, it requires listening, it requires some moments of silence and it requires honesty. All the things that you say about friendship you can say, by analogy, about prayer.

Any healthy relationship can use some humor. Likewise, our relationship with God can also use some lightheartedness. It's O.K. to be playful with God in your prayer and accept that God might want to be playful with you.

Once, when she was traveling to one of her convents, St. Teresa of Avila was knocked off her donkey and fell into the mud, injuring her leg. "Lord, you couldn't have picked a worse time for this to happen. Why would You let this happen?" And the response in prayer that she heard was, "That is how I treat My friends." To which Teresa said, "And that is why You have so few of them!" That's a playful way of addressing God and assumes God's own playfulness.

Can you allow God to give you things that delight you and give you joy? Can you allow yourself to think that the wonderful or funny or unexpected things that surprise you just might be signs of God being playful with you?

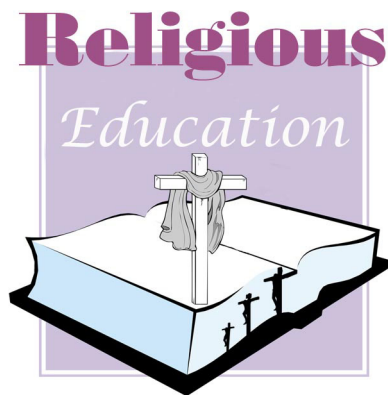

February 27, 2012 - Arrival at Ben Gurion Airport, where you will be met by a local representative and transferred to your 4 Star Hotel. **6:00pm: Orientation and Welcome Dinner!** Overnight in Jerusalem.

February 28, 2012 - Jerusalem - Old City: (B) Drive to Mount of Olives for a panoramic view of the city. Visit the Church of All Nations, King David's Tomb and the Room of the Last Supper on Mount Zion. Enter within the walls of the city and visit the Cardo, Temple Mount (entrance to the mosques not included), Western Wall, Via Dolorosa, the Church of the Holy Sepulcher and the Oriental Bazaar. February 29, 2012 -(B) Jerusalem – New City and Bethlehem: Drive to **Ein Kerem** to visit the **Church of Visitation**; proceed to **Yad Vashem** Memorial to the Holocaust. Visit the **Israel Museum**, the **Shrine of the Book** which houses the Dead Sea Scrolls and the miniature model of Jerusalem as it was during the Second Temple period. Proceed to **Bethlehem**** to visit the **Church of the Nativity**. Overnight in Jerusalem.

March 1, 2012 - (B) Dead Sea / Massada: Drive to **Qumeran**, where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found. Visit the ancient city of **Qumeran** and drive along the shore of the **Dead Sea**, the lowest place on earth, to **Massada**, the last stronghold of the Jews after the destruction of the Second Temple in 73 A.D. Ascend Massada by cable car and visit the food storeroom, water irrigation system and Herod's Palace. Descend by cable car. Time and weather permitting, an opportunity will be provided to float on the **Dead Sea**. Return to Jerusalem for overnight.

March 2, 2012 -(B) Beit Shean / Nazareth: Depart Jerusalem and drive via the Jordan Valley to **Beit Shean**, a newly excavated city, and visit the **Roman theatre**. Drive to **Yardenit**, the baptismal site on the **Jordan River**, and continue to **Nazareth** via **Cana of Galilee**. In Nazareth, we shall visit the **Church of the Annunciation**, **St. Joseph's Workshop** and **Mary's Well**. Overnight at Kibbutz Lavi.

March 3, 2012 -(B) Tiberias / Capernaum / Banias: After a short tour of **Tiberias**, we take a boat ride to **Capernaum**. Visit the remains of the 2nd century synagogue. Proceed to **Tabgha**, the site of the miracle of fish and loaves, and visit the **Church of Multiplication** with its 4th century mosaic floor. Continue to **Mount of the Beatitudes**, the place where Jesus delivered the Sermon on the Mount. Drive to the **Banias Springs** and Waterfall and tour the **Golan Heights**. Return to Kibbutz Lavi for dinner and overnight.

March 4, 2012 -(B) Acre / Haifa / Megiddo / Caesarea: Depart Kibbutz Lavi and drive to **Acre** to visit the ancient city and harbor. Continue to **Haifa** to view the Persian Gardens at the **Baha'i Shrine**. Continue to **Megiddo**, identified as the site of Armageddon to visit the archeological excavations, including the well-preserved water supply system. Drive to **Caesarea**, capital of Judea under the Romans. Visit the excavations of the ancient city, Roman theatre and aqueduct. Drive along the coastal plain to **Tel Aviv**. Overnight in Tel Aviv
